The Problem: A Legacy of Abandoned Wells Pollution, An Unfair Bill for the Public


Oil and gas corporations have made billions drilling in New Mexico. When the wells stop producing, too many companies walk away-leaving aging, leaking infrastructure behind. These abandoned wells can leak toxins into our air and water, harm our health, and cost the public millions in cleanup.

Right now, corporations are only required to set aside a tiny fraction of the money it actually takes to safely plug and clean up their wells. That means New Mexicans are left holding the bill-and the risk.

We can fix this with common-sense rules that ensure:

- If you drill it, you clean it,
- Our land, water, and families are protected, and
- Communities get good-paying jobs cleaning up the mess.

The Fair Fix: Update the Rules So Polluters Pay

New Mexicans believe in fairness: If you make a mess, you clean it up. But outdated bonding rules let oil and gas corporations drill now and skip out on cleanup later.

We're working together—community members, environmental and social justice organizations, concerned residents, independent experts in oil and gas operations and abandoned wells—to change that.

A new proposal to the Oil Conservation Commission would:

- ▶ Modernize bonding rules to \$150,000 per inactive or high-risk well
- Require bonds for every well from operators with 15%+ idle wells to reduce financial risk
- Prevent operators who can't afford to plug wells or operators who have a record of not following the rules from inheriting wells
- Limit "temporary abandonment" at 8 years to end the abandonment loophole
